**Course objectives:**

1. Introduce to students the need of sound methods of organizing (large amount of) data.
2. Introduce to students the need of efficient algorithms.
3. Introduce to students mathematical methods for algorithm analysis.
4. Introduce to students basic data structures and algorithms.
5. Enhance students programming abilities.

2. Mathematical background (2 weeks)
3. Review and further introduction of C (1 week)
4. List (2 weeks)
5. Stack (1 week)
6. Queue (1 week)
7. Simple trees (2 weeks)
