Overview

The Macau Student Affairs Institute (MSAI) is designed to introduce faculty and administrative staff members to student affairs practice in higher education. Participants will identify and understand such topics as the history, philosophy and values of student affairs work; identify professional competencies; understand the role of student development, learning theory, and environmental theory in guiding intentional professional practice; understand and develop basic professional skills such as helping skills and community building skills; identify and explore functional areas in student affairs and the organization of those functions; identify dimensions of academic and student affairs partnerships; identify and understand the role of research, assessment and evaluation; and integrate and synthesize institute learning through applications to case studies and group projects. Based on local needs, this Institute has a special focus on understanding, designing, and implementing residential colleges and living-learning programs.

MSAI is based on best practices in student affairs preparation as practiced in the United States, uses foundational and timely readings, and encourages participant critique and adaptation of material to their own institutional and student contexts appropriate to this region. MSAI is an intensive introduction or overview to key dimensions of professional student affairs scholarship and practice. Participants are expected to continue their own professional growth through continued readings, professional conferences, and on-campus professional development with peers.
